
Values CARES Matrix





MUDLARKS CLASS REPORT

IT'S HARD TO BELIEVE WE'RE ALREADY IN TERM 3.

It's hard to believe we're already in Term 3! The Mudlarks have settled back into our school routines, and it's been encouraging to see how much growth each child has made so far this year.

This term in English, we are exploring information reports through the engaging text Dingo by Claire Saxby. The students have worked together to create a class story map and are learning to retell the report orally. Our Year Ones will soon take the next step by writing their own full information reports.





In Maths, we've been investigating patterns—spotting them, creating them, and describing the unit of repeat. We've also been revising concepts from last semester and re-learning how to play Numero. The students have become so confident playing One More/One Less that they've forgotten some of the rules of Numero! Both games are great for building number fluency.

As part of our work with The Resilience Project, we've been learning about emotional literacy. One activity involved drawing surfing cats (yes, you read that right!) to explore different types of activities that can help our bodies feel calm and in balance when emotional


Mathematics has seen us continue with bond blocks, a variety of mental maths skills and some problem solving. In written maths we have been working on our multiplication.

The semester will culminate in building the skills needed for our end-of-year performances.

BUILDING TRUST AND TEAMWORK:

To start the term, we tried a Drama warm-up that focused on trust, timing, and connection.

Students lay in a line with their heads gently on each other's tummies, listening to the rhythm of breathing. What began as quiet giggles soon grew into unstoppable laughter – a fun way to practise working as a group, breaking down shyness, and learning to relax together before we explore bigger Drama activites.


Look What We Learned

Our first session for Term 3 was a Better Beginnings session, where we read the story Purlka ngamaji Kakaji, an Aboriginal story from the Kimberleys about a mummy goanna. We also watched this on YouTube, where both the Traditional language and English language were used. We decorated wooden Australian animals with plastic coloured dots.

Our sensory tray is full of nature items, including leaves, nuts, bark, and feathers. It also has an assortment of Australian animals. Ava and Alba have enjoyed using the feathers to pretend to make the different animals fly - have you ever seen a flying echidna?

We have been using playdough to make animal tracks, boomerangs and spears.

This week we read Djiti Djit and made a willy wagtail (Djiti Djiti) using black and white crepe paper to collage the body and a fork dipped in black paint to make the long tail feathers.

Kondinin School Board Notes

Our latest School Board meeting held on 4th August 2025. We covered a lot of content in this meeting. This included:

- Chaplain/Wellbeing Officer the difference between the positions is that a Chaplain is religion based. Both positions require a Certificate IV in Youth Work or Pastoral Care. The school has funding for this position for 2 days a week, and Aleks and Naomi will start the process of finding a Student Wellbeing Officer for the school.
- **PALS grant** this was successful. \$3130.00 was received to paint a mural on the Art Shed. Indigenous students have designed the mural which has been sent to artists Kirk & Darralyn Ugle.
- **Social and Emotional Wellbeing Data** Aleks went through the data. There was plenty of areas for celebration, but also a few that required further lines of inquiry and watching.
- Business Plan Update
- Elastik This assessment data collection was explained in more detail.
- **School Development Day** An overview of what was covered by staff on 21st July. 19th December will be traded off with extra staff meetings held on early closure days
- Next meeting will be 8th September 2025 which will be Board Training for all School Board members.
